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Council President Biasiotta continued:

“I want to go over Frankie’s television films really quickly -- *We Still Say Grace, The Middle, Fear of the Walking Dead, Zero’s Two Undercover Squad, Henry Danger* on Nickelodeon, *Purity, Summer of Aliens, College Fever, Bay Blue, Lexi, and Change*. In addition, he has done commercials such as Subway and has been in web films such as Paramount Studios student films.”

Council President Biasiotta concluded:

“What a record at such a young age, and what a representative of Seven Hills! So, thank you Frankie and, Erika, his mom.”

Ms. Kelly stated:

“I would like to thank Ms. Wolf for coming today and accepting the Resolution of Commendation on your son’s behalf. Congratulations to your son, and you as well. Thank you so much.”

RESOLUTION NO. 21-2019 IS DECLARED ADOPTED.

There was a hearty round of applause from the audience and all those present upon the adoption of Resolution No. 21-2019.

Council President Biasiotta stated that Frankie Wolf was unable to be here today because he is currently in Los Angeles. He said that Frankie’s mom, Erika, is here in his absence to accept the Resolution of Commendation in Frankie Wolf’s honor. Council President Biasiotta stated that Councilman Elliott would do the presentation this evening.

Councilman Elliott left the dais and presented the Resolution of Commendation to Frankie’s mom, who accepted the commendation on Frankie Wolf’s behalf, with his congratulations and best wishes.

There was an additional round of applause from everyone present in recognition of Frankie Wolf after presentation of the Resolution of Commendation was completed.

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ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

Ordinance No. 112-2019 – AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF SEVEN HILLS TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT COMMENCING OCTOBER 1, 2019 THROUGH SEPTEMBER 30, 2020, IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$787,252.32, WITH MEDICAL MUTUAL OF OHIO, FOR THE FURNISHING OF MEDICAL INSURANCE BENEFITS FOR QUALIFIED FULL-TIME CITY EMPLOYEES; AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE MAYOR TO SIGN, ON BEHALF OF THE CITY OF SEVEN HILLS, ANY AND ALL DOCUMENTS NECESSARY TO IMPLEMENT AND GIVE FORCE AND EFFECT TO SAID MEDICAL COVERAGES; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

MOTION by Mr. Greenwald, seconded by Ms. Kelly, to read Ordinance No. 112-2019 by title only for its first and final reading.

Mr. Greenwald stated:

“The reason for the emergency is that it is necessary to pass this in order to ensure continuing medical insurance for the employees of the City of Seven Hills.”

MOTION CARRIED

Ordinance No. 112-2019 was read by full title only for its first and final reading.

MOTION by Mr. Greenwald, seconded by Ms. Kelly, to pass Ordinance No. 112-2019 as an emergency measure.

Mr. Martin stated:

“I assumed there was going to be some discussion on this topic. I have spoken with Sonja (*Director of Finance Herwick*) -- I did get the information regarding the increase, which is an extremely high increase for any entity to absorb, whether it's in the private sector or in a government sector. I guess the discussion I never did hear from was the ability to pay for this purely out of the coffers of Seven Hills, or is there a participation that is expected by our own employees in this day and age -- that the participation rates be reflective of what occurs in most other governmental entities as well as the private sector. The rates currently being enjoyed by our employees are excessively low, in this day and age of health care costs. This is a very large cost that has been carried over in this new contract. It is an issue that I believe needs to be explored; what the participation rates are to be able to have the ability to continue benefits at this level. There needs to be participation by everybody -- not just the taxpayers themselves.”

Director of Public Service and Properties Johnson stated:

“Councilman, to your comments, the participation rate of employees is collectively bargained. That might be a subject to be brought through the collective bargaining process.”

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(In the following comments by Mayor Dell'Aquila, several portions are inaudible and unable to be transcribed due to audio microphone issues. Those particular areas have been marked as 'inaudible'.)

Mayor Dell'Aquila stated:

"I do have some remarks. I think we are at the point of weeding at this point rather than *inaudible*. I will have some comments. I know there has been a lot of consternation over this issue and a lot of dialogue. I just have a brief summary that I would like to provide to Council explaining where we are *inaudible*. Seven Hills health insurance rates have remained relatively stable for a number of years now. *Inaudible*. On the average, in a five-year period, the industry assumption is that, that plan will have *inaudible*. The City has basically gone seven years *inaudible* one bad year."

Mayor Dell'Aquila continued:

"Our broker, I believe, has done an exceptional job with keeping our costs really steady for the last several years. For the 2014-2015 plan year, the 2015-2017, there was a twelve percent increase for each year. For 2017-2019 plan years, there was an eight percent increase."

Mayor Dell'Aquila continued:

"On July 22, 2019 our insurance broker first informed the City of the current renewal of almost a thirty percent increase. This is the reason we are trying to get all of our employees into the FireForm application format so that our group can be shopped in hopes of decreasing the rates. Unfortunately, the rate increase is tied to the claims in the current plan. *Inaudible*. In the interim, the City must provide coverage during the time the group is being shopped, which is why the Administration is asking for passage of the renewal so as to allow the City to pay incoming invoices until our group is moved and/or our premium is reduced."

Mayor Dell'Aquila concluded:

"The goal is to allow us to align the plan year, currently October through September to the HSA format. Because the different cycles can cause confusion. Given the City's long history of good years with Medical Mutual, getting the lower quotes and negotiating *inaudible*."

“I just want to thank the City for having the foresight to do this. The Hemlock Creek Project has been a very long and expensive and drawn-out project, not only for the City but for the residents as well. But to do part of the street, especially a street that has been basically demolished by the construction project, and not do the street, part of the street that is directly involved in the sewers, is kind of silly. So, I appreciate the forethought and the intelligence in doing this at this time. Thank you.”

Mr. Biasiotta stated:

“I will briefly state for the record that it was handled in two parts, so that the part of the street that was not part of Hemlock would not be assessed to the residents. This additional expenditure is rolled into the overall 2019 Street Program so that the impacted residents of Hemlock are not singled out to bear this expense. That is the rationale for two pieces of the project.”

This is a change to the original preventative maintenance contract with Fallsway that was only for \$1,499.00. So, we are doing an extra preventative maintenance. This is not part of the repair bill that I mistakenly said during Caucus. I wanted all Council to know that I made that error and I am correcting the record. This is just preventative maintenance.”

Mr. Elliott stated, “Mr. President, that is kind of where I was getting at the first time around. I was wondering why it went up so much.”

Council President Biasiotta replied, “Yes, well.....”

Mr. Elliott continued, “I mean, if I’m correct, it is almost.....”

Council President Biasiotta replied:

“Looking it over, they are doing the chassis this time as opposed to just normal oil changes and stuff. So, they are greasing, doing a grease job and its amount is not to exceed, so it is also going to cover any deficiencies found so the amount could come in lower. It is not a set amount. They are doing preventative maintenance, looking for what they can find and we are setting a cap on the spending. It does not necessarily mean that they are going to spend the full \$3,200.00 extra. It is Engine No. 1, and not Engine No. 2, if I said that.”
