Dear Seven Hills Residents,

Welcome to our Home Days edition of our City Newsletter! We are back to a full schedule of community activity. Hurray! Since my last communication we had what could have been our best annual Memorial Day parade ever. Multiple groups participated including an Army National Guard Unit, the Normandy, Parma and Padua Marching Bands and a local bag pipe team. Our service department got the parade route ready by hanging over 2 miles of American Flags. Memorial Day activities were quickly followed by our Baseball Opening Day celebration at Calvin Park. This event was well attended, with at least twice as many people as in 2019. (Remember, baseball was canceled in 2020 due to COVID). Among the many activities that day was a visit by the Cleveland Indians Sugardale Hot Dog Mascots.



City Hall is now fully reopened, including our newly renovated community room. Our various senior groups are utilizing this room, and it is great to see them all again. Activity abounds at our community center with both our Summer Camp and Learn To Swim Programs in session. Over 100 participants daily!!

Noise restrictions

The Seven Hills Police Department would like to remind all residents that summer is here which means nice weather, yard work and more people out and about in the neighborhoods. You may not know that while working in the yard there are some City Ordinances that limit the hours you can complete certain yard work or play loud music or create similar types of noise. Here are the hours that allow you to use different types of tools or play radios and other similar devices. The entire ordinances can be viewed on the city's website.

Theft from vehicles

Summer is always the time we experience thefts from cars that are left unlocked in driveways and streets. Please remember to remove all valuables from your vehicles each night and lock your car doors. Solicitors/Do Not Knock List

Also, The Seven Hills Police Department would like to remind residents that if you are on the do not knock list and unwanted solicitors are still knocking on your door that you should notify the Police Department immediately.

Underage Drinking Laws

What parents should know:

As a parent, you cannot give alcohol to your teen's friends under the age of 21 under any circumstances, even in your own home, even with their parent's permission.

You cannot knowingly allow a person under 21, other than your own child, to remain in your home or on your property while consuming or possessing alcohol.

If you break the law:

You can face a maximum sentence of six months in jail and/or a \$1,000 fine.

Others can sue you if you give alcohol to anyone under 21, and they, in turn, hurt someone, hurt themselves or damage property.

Officers can take any alcohol, money, or property used in committing the offense.

Things you can do as a parent:

- Refuse to supply alcohol to children.
- Be at home when your teen has a party.
- Make sure that alcohol is not brought into your home or property by your teen's friends.
- Talk to other parents about not providing alcohol at other events your child will be attending.

Create alcohol free opportunities and activities in your home so teens will feel welcome.

Please review Chapter 529 of the Seven Hills Codified Ordinances for applicable liquor control offenses.

There is a very good chance that you will be on your own during the early stages following catastrophic disasters of which we have seen quite a few to date. After such a disaster, citizens will be eager to help. Experience has shown that basic training in preparedness, disaster survival and rescue skills improves the ability of citizens to survive and assist others until responders or other assistance arrives.

We are proud to say that **QUAD CITY CERT** volunteers used their preparedness training and volunteered over **1000 hours** in support of the Cuyahoga County Board of Health assisting at COVID-19 vaccination clinics.

The **QUAD CITY Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)** is a training program that allows civilians and government employees to take the necessary steps in an emergency to save lives and support local emergency responders. The **QUAD CITY CERT Team** consists of the communities of Brooklyn Heights, Independence, Seven Hills and Valley View. We welcome our surrounding communities to join us as well.

The basic **CERT** course will include those components necessary to get you started and capable of performing basic CERT functions. The training program is hands-on, realistic and is designed to help you protect yourself, your family, your school, your workplace, and your neighbors and your neighborhood in an emergency and non-emergency situations.

Participants will complete **24 hours** of training (one Wednesday evening a week for 8 weeks) which is provided **free of charge**. Those 14 years of age or older in the four **QUAD CITY** communities are encouraged to attend training. (Ages 14 to 17 will be required to have parental consent). Upon completion of training, 24 hours of community service credits will be given to students. High school students from the four **QUAD CITY** communities can also apply for our college scholarships. **CERT** certification looks great on a college application!!!!!!

The CERT Program trains you in basic disaster response skills:

- #1 - Disaster Preparedness
- #2 - Team Organization
- #3 - Disaster Medical Operations Part 1 and 2
- #4 - Disaster Psychology/Light Search and Rescue Operations
- #5 - CPR/AED and Stop the Bleed
- #6 - Fire Safety
- #7 - Active Shooter and Terrorism
- #8 - Review and Graduation

Flooding Emergency – on Weekends and after hours, please call Non-Emergency Dispatch at (216) 524-3911 and they will contact the Service Department to assist in any Flooding Emergency.

Water Main Breaks - Should you notice bubbling or streaming water along the roadway or tree laws, please call the Cleveland Water Department at 216-664-3060 to report the break.

Street Light Outages - To report a street light outage, broken fixture or light flickering please call The Illuminating Company at 1-888-544-4877 or the Service Department at 216-525-6225.

Rubbish Pickup - Rubbish should be placed on the tree lawn by 7:00AM on the scheduled day of collection and shall not be placed earlier than 4:00PM on the day prior to the scheduled date of collection. Collection is delayed one day the week of Labor Day. Mattresses, box spring and fabric/leather furniture must be wrapped in plastic. Call to schedule the bulk pickup with Waste Management 866-797-9018 or Service Department 216-525-6225.

Brush & Branch Collection - Place branches on the tree lawn for the City to chip. No need to bundle or tie. Call the Service Department to schedule at 216-525-6225.

Document Shredding – The next scheduled date will be **August 17th** from 1PM-7PM behind City Hall. Documents will be shredded on site. This service is for Seven Hills residents only. Residents of Seven Hills may bring their personal records, financial documents, letters, manila folders, ledgers, cancelled checks, old invoices and bills. Staples and paperclips do not need to be removed. No plastic, metal spirals, 3-ring binders, cardboard or magazines.

Household Hazardous Waste & Computer Roundup - The next roundup will be **September 14th** from 8AM to 6PM behind City Hall. For more information please check the Cuyahoga county solid waste district website: www.cuyahogarecycles.org/seven-hills

Tire Roundup – You may drop off your car or light truck tires (20” or less) behind City Hall on **September 14th** from 8AM to 6PM. Scrap tires must be off the rim.

Household Material Accepted - Oil or solvent-based paint, sealers, primers, or coatings (aerosols or liquids) – varnishes, polyurethane, shellacs, paint thinner, mineral spirits, turpentine, pesticides, herbicides, fungicides, caustic household cleaners, automotive fluid, motor oil, car batteries, adhesives, driveway sealer, kerosene, gasoline, lighter fluid, mercury.

Materials Not Accepted - Latex paint, explosives, gun powder, ammunition, flares, medical waste, pharmaceuticals, sharps, radioactive waste, florescent bulbs.

Computer Materials Accepted - Computers, printers, cable boxes, calculators, toner, back up batteries, stereo systems, keyboards, mouse, cell phones, fax machines, power supplies, laptops, speakers, telephones, network systems, circuit boards, modems, test equipment, cable, wire, hard drives, extension cords, copy machines VHS/DVD players, routers, switches, laptop batteries, LCD monitors, cameras, printer cartridges, typewriters, servers, CDROM/floppy drives, DVR recorder.

Mailboxes - Now is the time to make repairs to your mailbox. Make sure the Mailbox is in good condition, securely attached to a substantial support at the proper height and at the proper distance from the roadway. Custom made mailboxes should be shielded or replaced for winter with a standard box.

***** Hemlock Creek Watershed Utility Improvement Project – REMINDER: The new sanitary sewer main is available for connecting to! *****

Attention affected property owners / residents on **Hillside Drive, Cherry Lane, Nemet Drive, Twilight Drive, Shady Lane, North Mary Lane, Mary Lane, South Mary Lane, Seven Hills Boulevard, and Oak Lane:**

NOTE: For property owners who have not yet connected their homes to the new sanitary sewer, the Cuyahoga County Board of Health will be mailing you a second notice letter containing specific information and requirements sometime in January or February of 2021.

- As you are likely aware, many residents have already connected to the new sanitary sewer and have had their septic systems properly abandoned.
- As a reminder, the information packet (“*SANITARY SEWER - SERVICE LINE INSTALLATION INFORMATION*”) provided at the February 29, 2020 meeting is available online at <http://www.sevenhillsohio.org/en-US/Hemlock-Creek.aspx>. Since this packet provides permit requirements and details, you are encouraged to let your Contractor know that the information packets are available online.
- All property owners / residents should have received by U.S. Mail a City of Seven Hills “Public Sanitary Sewer Availability” letter dated April 10, 2020.
 - At this time, your City-registered Contractor can apply for the required City Building Permit.
 - All property owners should have been notified via U.S. Mail by the Cuyahoga County Board of Health with the official connection notice. This letter is considered your official order from the Board to connect to the sanitary sewer and properly abandon your septic tank as per Ohio Administrative Code Section 3701-29-06(l) under the authority vested in Ohio Revised Code Sections 3709.21 and 3718.10.

Please note, final assessment costs have been communicated to all property owners via U.S. Mail in a letter sent May 21, 2021. The official Final Assessment letter will be sent out once the Final Assessing Ordinance is passed by City Council in June 2021.

- Please be mindful of neighboring properties who may be having construction work performed for connecting to the new sanitary sewer.
- Various construction equipment may be operating in the nearby vicinity.
- Use common sense to ensure that children (and adults) keep away from all construction equipment whether it is operating or not.

***** 2020/2021 Sewer Rehabilitation – Bayberry Area *****

UPDATE: This important sanitary sewer rehabilitation project has begun as of **May 26, 2021**. There are 8 streets where public sanitary sewers where work will be occurring as follows:

- Streets (3) where sanitary sewers will be cleaned:** **Waxberry Drive, Driftwood Drive, and Bittersweet Drive**
- Streets (5) where sanitary sewers will be cleaned and lined:** **Panorama Drive, Firethorn Drive, Primrose Drive, Bayberry Drive, and Tanglewood Drive.**

The Engineering Department has solicited for public bids for this Project. The following are some additional notes on the Project

There will be no major construction being performed that would affect vehicular traffic and/or general disturbances for the residents along the 8 streets.

Work is anticipated to last up to 180 days. Further information & notification will be provided to residents on the 8 streets by the Contractor performing the work.

***** 2021 Road Program *****

UPDATE: Public bids have been opened and the “lowest and best” bids have been recommended for City Council acceptance as follows:
 Asphalt Streets – Ronyak Paving, Inc.
 Concrete Streets – Specialized Construction, Inc.

Once City Council accepts the bids (expected in June 2021), the Engineering Department will work with the contractors to get work started. It is anticipated that work will begin in late June/early July 2021. Notices will be sent out to residents prior to work beginning.

There are 12 streets are getting rehabilitated and resurfaced for the 2021 construction season as follows:

4.	East Decker Drive (Northview to East Dartmoor)

7.	Jasmine Drive (H.N. 2938 to western terminus)
8.	Karen Drive
9.	South Main Hill Drive
10.	Tanglewood Lane
11.	Chestnut Road
12.	Seven Hills Boulevard

Also included in the 2021 Road Program is the City-owned parking lot located at the Northeast corner of the Broadview Road / Hillside Road intersection where a new gazebo will be built this year. The parking lot is approximately 9,100 square feet.

*** Cheryl Ann Drive Culvert Improvements ***

UPDATE: This project has been publicly bid and the contract has been awarded. Construction is anticipated to begin at the end of June 2021. More information to follow as the time approaches.

*** 2021 Crack Sealing Program ***

UPDATE: Public bids have been opened and the apparent low bidder is Specialized Construction, Inc. It is expected that City Council will accept the "lowest and best" bid in June 2021 and work will commence thereafter. The Engineering and Service Departments are working to finalize the list of streets to be crack sealed this year.

*** 2021 Pavement Markings Program ***

UPDATE: Bid books are being prepared to publicly bid this program. It is anticipated that this program will be bid in June 2021 and work will begin sometime this summer. More information to follow.

*** City Gazebo ***

UPDATE: The City is working to get this project moving along. It is anticipated that construction activity will begin soon and this project should be completed later this year. More information to follow.

A friendly reminder to property taxpayers regarding a change in the billing process for annual sewer maintenance fees: The City will no longer be sending out separate bills for sewer maintenance fees. The City has worked with Cuyahoga County to add those fees to your property tax bill, billed in two equal halves. The fee will show up as a special assessment charge on your property tax bill from the County. The special assessment charge is not a new tax or fee; rather, it is simply a change in the billing and collection method of the City's sewer maintenance fee.

Building Department News

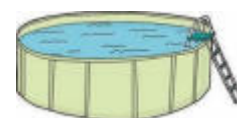
The Building Department remains open and accessible at a walk-up window outside the Police Department entrance or in person at our counter. We have placed a doorbell on the window frame to get our attention in case we do not see you at first. **Our hours at the window and counter are from 8:00 AM to 4:15 AM Monday through Friday. Our phone number is 216.524.4427.**

As we begin to open our windows and enjoy the fresh air please be aware of the hours for operating yard maintenance equipment. Our Codified Ordinance relating to this matter is 555.03. It relates to various noise disturbances to consider such as lawn mowers and power tools during the hours of 8:00 AM to 9:30 PM on weekdays and between 9:00 AM to 8:00 PM on Saturdays and Sundays. Construction projects are not to begin using tools and equipment before 7:30 AM to 9:00 PM on weekdays and between 9:00 AM to 8:00 PM on Saturdays and Sundays.

Garage sale regulations require permits for the approved dates in the months of April through October. Each residence is permitted to have 3 garage sales each season with one being the City-Wide Sale which is in August this year on the dates of 19th-21st. We need to know the dates of your sale and your address and a contact person with phone number in order to issue the permit. There are no fees for garage sale permits.

Building Permits are required for an array of improvement projects you may wish to undertake on your home and in your yard. Some of the more common ones are for sheds and outbuildings, decks and patios, driveways and various concrete flatwork projects, fences and swimming pools, roofing, windows and siding.

Property maintenance enforcement is another responsibility of the Building Department. We appreciate all those that aspire to keep their lawns mowed and maintained and free of weeds and overgrowth during the summer months. We also ask that you store firewood and other outdoor equipment in a tidy manner as to not offend your neighbors in any way. We ask that property owners be diligent with the upkeep of their structures addressing property maintenance issues in order that we all can enjoy ourselves free of neighborhood distractions while increasing our property values.

The Historical Society sends our continued wishes for a successful return to a normal life on the waning Covid pandemic...starting with Home Days in Seven Hills August 27 to August 29, 2021

A HISTORICAL NOTE: Seven Hills is small in area but not in history. Its history goes back quite far even to prehistoric times.

Scientists have determined that the areas around Rockside and Broadview Roads extending down to the Cuyahoga Valley are where dinosaurs and other prehistoric animals including dinosaurs roamed. Prehistoric animal bones were found in a quarry belong to the Woolly Mammoth. Two million years ago, give or take a year, our little area of the world was a shore of a shallow sea with a Sandy beach and lots of generations of shellfish. So in Seven Hills back yards there is an over abundance of sand or clay and shale.

Different Indian tribes roamed and hunted over the grounds in this area. The tribes included the Cayuga, Cherokees, Chippewas, Delawares, Hurons, Miamis, Montoes, Mohawks, Ottawas, just to name a few.

In 1662 King Charles II of England made a subsidy of land to the United States and In 1795 townships were organized and Seven Hills was one of them.

We are not sure if the Historical Society Room will be open for Home Days being held August 27 through August 29, BUT... if we are "look for the Historical Society Room Sign" when you come to Home Days.

Do remember we have a dedicated room filled with memorabilia from Seven Hills which will be opened in the future.

COUNCIL QUARTERLY



Hello Seven Hills Residents:

While last year certainly challenged all of us, I am glad to see that we are turning the corner and getting back to life as we know it. For me, turning the corner officially began at our Memorial Day Parade. It was great to see so many residents outside and enjoying themselves. I am hopeful that our Home Days will be a huge success. It is truly a great feeling to be able to gather and mingle with our residents again after such a long hiatus.

I am happy to announce that Council will be officially returning to Council Chambers on June 15th after a long 14 months of teleconferenced meetings. All residents are welcome to attend and as of now we still must adhere to the guidelines established by the CDC. The meeting dates and times are posted on the Event Calendar via the City website at www.sevenhillsohio.org.

Some highlights in Council News:

*On March 30, 2021 Council approved Ordinance 17-2021 to upgrade Meijer Park (formerly Valleywood Park) with LED lighting

*On April 13, 2021, Council approved Ordinance 34-2021 to Authorize the Mayor to partner with the Western Reserve Land Conservancy to acquire property located at North Park (North Park Nature Preserve). Not only will the park have miles of newly added walking trails but we are hopeful that at some point, we can connect the trails to the park in the Village of Brooklyn Heights.

*On May 11, 2021, Council approved Ordinance 40-2021 to accept a generous donation (\$45K) from Meijers for the cost of a new scoreboard at Meijer Park and the renaming of the park for a 10 year term.

*On May 25, 2021, Council approved Ordinance 41-2021 to purchase a new transit van to replace the old and failing Community Service Bus. Funds from a Community Development Supplemental Grant of \$50K was applied to the purchase. We have already taken delivery of the new vehicle.

*On May 25, 2021, Council approved Ordinances 44/45-2021 to move forward with our 2021 Road Program. This year eleven (11) streets will be resurfaced: Chestnut Road, Elmhurst Drive (EPV to Evelyn), Summitview Drive, E. Decker Drive (Northview to Dartmoor), E. Hillsdale Avenue (W. 9th to Northview), Glenella Drive, Jasmine Drive, Karen Drive, S. Main Hill Drive and Tanglewood Lane. Please exercise caution when driving through construction areas.

On the upcoming Council Agenda:

*Council will be voting on an Ordinance for the purchase of a new wood chipper, an asphalt hot box and a Leaf Vac Machine for our Service Department. The Service Department has done such a commendable job keeping up with the needs of our residents. It is vital to have the necessary tools to do the job efficiently and in a timely manner. If approved by Council, this will be another great benefit to our residents.

*Continuing discussions on Ordinance 32-2021, proposed by Councilman Elliott to allow chickens/chicken coops in our City. The legislation is still being reviewed within the Committee for additional work.....stay tuned

More good things to look forward to in 2021.....

Greetings Seven Hills and Ward 1 Residents,

Summer is upon us and great news, the pandemic is essentially behind us. Therefore, it is time to set our sights on the upcoming Seven Hills Home Days. This year's Home Days celebration will commence on the weekend of August 27th and as in previous years, will be located behind City Hall. In addition, the Seven Hills Farmers' Market will make its much-anticipated return in 2021 beginning July 1, running through September 30th. The Market will be open for business on Thursdays from 4pm – 7pm and is located at 7221 Broadview Road (the corner of Hillside and Broadview Roads).

Ward 1 News: Council members recently voted to approve the resurfacing and or repair of 11 streets within the city. The streets located in Ward 1 include East Clearview, East Hillsdale (West 9th to Northview), and East Decker (Northview to East Dartmoor). For the safety of all involved in this project, please be extra cautious when traveling in and around these areas during this process. Moreover, the Erie Bank Regional Headquarters located on Rockside Road held their groundbreaking ceremony on April 7th, 2021. The building's construction is currently in progress and is anticipated to be completed by year's end. Furthermore, the 20-acres of land adjacent to North Park is slated to become a nature preserve to include scenic walking trails with the addition of nature's bounty, consisting of newly planted trees, plants, and flowers. The city was able to acquire this property with the assistance of the Western Reserve Land Conservancy. Finally, I would like to personally thank voters for the passage of Issue 41 – the City Parks and Recreation Levy. Doing so will aid in the maintenance and upgrades of the city's parks and recreation center.

At last Ward 3 we are Back. By the time you read this, Council will have resumed in person meetings.

Also, WOW we did it. I am pleased to inform our Hemlocker's that the final assessments for the EPA mandated sanitary sewer project have been generated and I could not be more pleased with the results. The assessment for a single-family home should be \$8,736.32 and \$13,104.48 for a duplex. This is a fantastic reduction below the original engineering estimate of \$12,000.00 for a single-family home. To put that in perspective, that is approximately \$3,300.00 less per residence than the engineering estimate and if multiplied over approximately 300 residences equals a total benefit to the neighborhood of approximately \$990,000.00!

I have thoroughly enjoyed my time in public service to my city, including every aspect of this position. I am very proud of the fact that my friends and neighbors have allowed me the opportunity of a lifetime to accomplish so much, such as completion of the Hemlock Creek project, the Mapleview water line and repaving project, repaving of major streets like Donna Rae and finally this year Karen, etc. Also, through my chairmanship of the Planning and Zoning committee I have been heavily involved in the economic revitalization of the City, the Meijer project, the Erie Bank project, and the Dairy Queen development to name just a few.

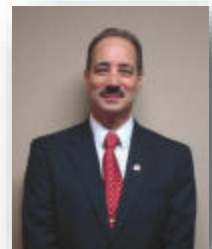

Ward 2 2021 Improvements

Hello Ward 2 neighbors! There has been a significant amount of activity across the City of Seven Hills over the past two years that has resulted in the continued improvement of our city as a whole, and in Ward 2. This includes projects involving our community services, such as: Streets, Parks, Community Service, Police and Fire.

Ward 2 Streets and Sewers:

Ward 2 Street Improvements: An important major street in our Ward 2 that will be asphalted this summer is Chestnut Road. Other neighborhood roadways to be paved include Tanglewood Lane and Glenella Drive. The streets of Seven Hills have been evaluated from an engineering study that created a rating system for the condition of our roadways. Ward 2 has been fortunate to have two of our major roadways upgraded recently (Crossview Road and East Ridgewood Drive).



Ward 2 Sewer Improvements: The streets with sewer improvements in 2021 include Bayberry, Panorama, Waxberry, Driftwood, Bittersweet, Firethorn, Primrose, and Tanglewood.

Other Equipment: Leaf pick-up and emergency limb chippers are being upgraded. The new equipment will be in place by the end of summer and ready for the autumn season and should result in improved services..

Parks and Recreation:

In previous newsletter articles I have discussed the **linkage between community amenities and economic development**. Due to the graciousness of our community, including Ward 2 voters, the City of Seven Hills will have the financial means to improve our parks and recreation opportunities. Families, and individuals young and old in our community will be able to take advantage of the improvements our parks will receive. These improvements are being coordinated via a "Master Park Improvement Plan." As the current chairman of the Parks and Rec committee, I look forward to the administration outlining a comprehensive plan with solid community feedback.

The Mayor and City Council plan to work closely to achieve the financial planning and execution necessary to bring long term improvements to our parks and to our Recreation Center.

As a Ward 2 resident, you have easy access to our closest park, John Glenn Park, which has quality basketball, tennis and play-ground equipment as well as just a pleasant place to sit and enjoy the vegetation in a quiet neighborhood setting. Ward 2 residents should also take advantage of visiting our other Seven Hills parks, including Calvin Park (which has first rate baseball fields and a pending project to improve the restroom facilities) as well as North Park, which has a pending walking path project that was recently approved by council (see our city website for more detailed information). Finally, Valleywood Park is undergoing a significant upgrade to the baseball scoreboard and will receive a number of other upgrades within the park due to an agreement the Mayor brought to City Council to receive significant contributions to the park from our new Meijer retail store partners. Thank you Meijer for being a good community partner and contributing to the park!

Community Services:

The mayor's administration and staff deserve recognition for the number of financial grants that the community has received in all of our service areas. They are continuing to work hard to receive additional grants that this community has not received before. These funding grants allow our community to benefit by supplementing our local tax revenues, allowing more services to be provided to the community.

One of these funding grants will assist in the purchase of a new community rider transport van that will be fully accessible for the physically challenged. That means more reliable service when shuttling our citizens to senior activities as well as usage with shuttling persons from remote parking areas to the annual community events.

Police:

Our police have demonstrated their quality service to Ward 2 residents over and over again. This has resulted in the City of Seven Hills having the well-deserved reputation as one of the safest communities in Ohio. New police cruisers purchased during the past two years allow our police force to have reliable SUVs to respond to your needs in all types of weather 24 hours a day.

Speed: As a resident and representative of Ward 2, I ask all city residents to please be respectful of our community's speed limits, especially on Chestnut Road, East Ridgewood Drive and Crossview Road. (Did I mention that the police have upgraded RADAR speed guns)?

Fire and Medical Service:

Chief: A new full-time fire chief provides the leadership for providing community fire and medical services protection for Ward 2 and throughout the community. Seven Hills has highly trained paramedic first responders and firefighters.

Ambulance: Ward 2 residents will benefit when the fire department deploys two new Paramedic Squad vehicles. Combined with existing rapid response times, our community is well protected during health emergencies.

Fire Truck: In addition, the community will benefit from the anticipated arrival of a new fire/pumper truck this coming fall. That means more water to a fire more quickly. The department has also recently achieved an impressive ISO rating of a 3! An ISO fire insurance rating, also referred to as a fire score or Public Protection Classification (PPC), is a score from 1 to 10 that indicates how well-protected our community is by the fire department. In the ISO rating scale, a lower number is better: The best possible rating is 1, while a rating of 10 means the fire

department did not meet the ISO's minimum requirements. According to the ISO's Fire Suppression Rating Schedule (FSRS), there are two main criteria to a fire rating score: A) 50% comes from the quality of our local fire department including staffing levels, training and proximity of the firehouse; B) 40% comes from availability of water supply, including the prevalence of fire hydrants and how much water is available for putting out fires. This recognizes that our department not only has the equipment, but also the wherewithal to empty the equipment and resources quickly, thus potentially lowering insurance premiums for our households and businesses.

Have an enjoyable summer season Ward 2 neighbors. Remember, our community thrives when it is "neat and tidy". Hope to see you at the Seven Hills Farmers Market!

Dear Seven Hills Residents,

One of my responsibilities as your Councilperson At-Large is being Chairman of the Public Works Council Committee. As part of this committee's work, I have been a member of the administration's Water Management Task Force. I am dedicating this article to that topic.

Our mission on the Task Force was to develop plans to remediate water-related issues.

Along the way partnered with other agencies, such as the NEORS, West Creek Conservancy, Cuyahoga County Public Works and others.

Our committee made recommendations on, Preventive maintenance of the City's storm and sanitary sewers, rehabilitation of the City's storm water control measures, improve / repair the City's existing storm / sanitary sewers, and address public / private property infiltration and outflow (I/I, cross-connection) issues.

The full list of the committee's findings to date and a video of the committee presenting our findings to Seven Hills Council's Public Works Committee can be found at:

Since the inception of Task Force, we have completed \$691,000 in additional (above our annual in-house sewer program) maintenance and repairs to our sewers and water control devices. Further we have targeted another additional \$1.9 million in maintenance and repairs for 2021.

A few specific examples are our partnership with Cuyahoga County Public Works for additional sewer maintenance, cleaning, and repairs. The dredging of detention and retention basins. The rehabilitation / planned rehabilitation of several sewer lines throughout (John Glenn, Rangeview, Graydon, Primrose Drive, Panorama Drive, Firethorn Drive, Bayberry Drive, Bittersweet Drive and Tanglewood Lane).

Other improvements included a new storm sewer outfall on Skyview, 2 double basins on Donna Rae, and this summer the complete restoration of Cheryl Ann Culvert.

Our work is not finished, and we will continue to pursue solutions.

The 2021 Seven Hills Farmers Market, sponsored by Taleris Credit Union, Inc. Vince Hrobat Insurance Agency, Inc. and United Healthcare, will open for its seventh season on Thursday, July 1st, 4:00 – 7:00 PM. The Seven Hills Farmers Market (SHFM), where consumers like to shop and vendors like to sell, is a weekly open-air market featuring local farmers and artisans who offer fresh produce, food items and products. The Market is located at 7221 Broadview Road, Seven Hills, Ohio (adjacent to Fire Station #1).

Growing community by inspiring healthy, sustainable, abundant living, the SHFM personnel are sincere about providing access to fresh local food and the part it plays in growing healthy communities. With Gov. Mike DeWine amending the state's mask order to match the CDC guidelines that end the face-covering requirement for fully vaccinated people to be lifted in full on June 2, along with most remaining COVID-19 health orders, the Market will return to its previous "no-yellow-caution-tape" look.

Fresh and local means that the fruits & vegetables available at the SHFM are dependent on the Northeast Ohio growing season. In July look for local lettuce, strawberries, raspberries, cherries, broccoli, tomatoes, peppers, and herbs. August brings beets, sweet corn, green beans, peaches, blueberries, cantaloupe, melons, zucchini, garlic, and onions. September showcases apples, blackberries, grapes, potatoes, squash, pumpkins and more. Also, some of the best bakery items, treats, honey and syrup in Seven Hills are available at the Market.

The SHFM also grows small businesses! The farmers and food producers who sell at the market are all from within a 50-mile radius. By supporting these vendors, residents and neighbors are directly helping over 20 local businesses (no middleman!) keeping buying power close to home, which benefits the Northeast Ohio economy. As a result of their loyalty, many of the vendors in the seven-year history of the SHFM have been able to expand their businesses into additional markets, grocery stores, restaurants and even storefronts.

The Seven Hills Farmers Market is grateful to their sponsors; Taleris Credit Union, Inc. Vince Hrobat Insurance Agency, Inc. and United Healthcare, who provide the funds for advertising and upgrades.

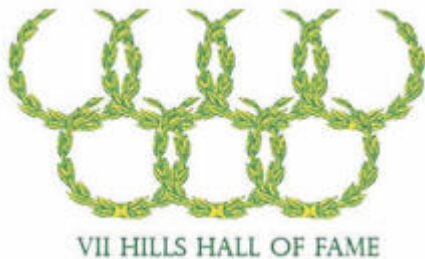

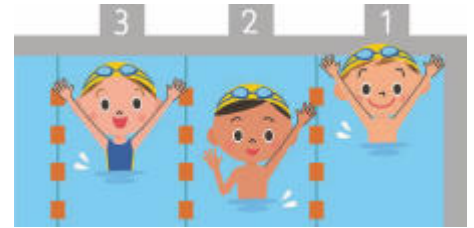
